To solve this issue, the TIA-568 standard defines three polarity implementation methods (Method A, B, and C), which are achieved by using specifically mapped MTP®/MPO cable types (Type A, B, and C). To comply with these standards, three types of MTP optical fibers with different structures are currently in use, namely Type A, Type B, and Type C, for.
